

# Forest Management effects on Water Quality


- Forests supply the cleanest water of any land use
- Trees and vegetation
  - Slows and filters stormwater runoff
  - Reduces soil erosion and pollutant loading
  - Shades waterbodies

#### **Tree Canopy**

Benefits of a healthy urban tree canopy

- Protects watershed health
- Protects drinking water supplies
- Protects surface water systems
- Reduces stormwater runoff volume
- And many other environmental, economic, and social benefits






## How to prioritize tree canopy for water

Plant trees along streets Adding trees to residential and commercial landscaping Enhancing tree canopy on undeveloped lands Integrating trees into stormwater facilities Extending tree canopy over impervious surfaces

#### Grey vs Green infrastructure

#### **Grey infrastructure**

- Systems of
  - Gutters
  - Pipes
  - Tunnels
- To move stormwater away from residential areas to treatment plants or local water bodies

#### **Green infrastructure**

- The range of measures that use
  - Plant or soil systems
  - Permeable surfaces
  - Stormwater harvest and reuse
  - Landscaping
- To store, infiltrate, or evapotranspirate stormwater and reduce flow to sewer systems





#### **Permeable Pavement**







Systems/practices that mimic or use natural processes that lead to the infiltration, evapotranspiration or use of stormwater to protect water quality and associated habitat.

- Rain gardens
- Bioswales
- Permeable pavement




#### Permeable Pavement

Water flows through the pavement layer into stormwater retention layer of storage







#### Factors influencing Tree Health

- Species selection: Should be based on the site-specific conditions
  - Shade tolerant/intolerant?
  - ❖ What soil is best for the species? Does this match the soil you are working with?
- Soil pH, chemistry, and composition
  - Soil nutrients; does it need fertilizer of any kind?
- Planting location

## Additional tips

- When appropriate you can increase leaf area by planting smaller shade tolerant trees under the larger dominant trees
- Use ground cover like mulch or vegetation under your tree canopy to increase the surface area for interception
- Maximize belowground soil volumes to help store stormwater runoff and encourage deep root growth









#### Summary



- Forest management is a key factor in watershed protection
- Managing trees minimizes the volume and improves the quality of stormwater runoff
